AFFIDAVIT OF K.K.

Sworn on June 26, 2019

I, K.K., of the City of Edmonton, in the Province of Alberta, SWEAR AND SAY THAT:

- I am a married father of a girl referred to as J.J., who has also sworn an affidavit in this matter. I have personal knowledge of the facts herein deposed except where based on information and belief, in which case I verily believe same to be true.
- 2. Use of the terms such as "we", "us" and "our" references my wife and myself.
- Our daughter suffers from a form of Autism Spectrum Disorder ("Autism") and Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder. As of the date of this affidavit, our daughter is 14 years of age and just finished grade 8. We love and cherish our daughter. Raising her has been challenging as she has struggled with the various symptoms of her Autism, with her social skills and with obsessive-compulsive behaviours. She is vulnerable because she is cognitively and intellectual delayed, emotionally immature and credulous. Further, she is impulsive and regularly compulsively fixates on certain ideas or thoughts to the point of unhealthy obsession.
- 4. My daughter attended an Edmonton Public Schools ("EPS") school (herein after referred to as "our daughter's school", "her school" and "the school") throughout her grade seven year, September 2017 to June 2018.
- Due to my daughter's diagnoses, vulnerabilities and social struggles, we decided it was best to educate her regarding matters of human sexuality at home.

 Further, our daughter specifically told us that she didn't want to take part in the class discussions of human sexuality.
- 6. To that effect, and in accordance with section 50.1 of the *School Act*, we submitted a Health Curriculum Content form (attached as **Exhibit "A"** to this affidavit) to our daughter's school on September 1, 2017, instructing the school

- to exclude our daughter from discussions, presentations, or material that explicitly discuss human sexuality.
- 7. From January 29, 2018 to February 2, 2018, my daughter participated in a weeklong school field trip to the University of Alberta with her class as part of the University of Alberta's U School Program. See "About U School" webpage attached as **Exhibit "B"** to this affidavit.
- 8. On the last day of the field trip, Friday, February 2, 2018, her class attended a session put on by fYrefly. See U School report excerpt listing fYrefly as a "Campus Partner" attached as **Exhibit "C"** to this affidavit.
- 9. According to my daughter who described the events in detail to me, two individuals who identified themselves as working with fYrefly presented to the class regarding sexuality and gender (the "fYrefly Presentation").
- 10. Notwithstanding the fact that human sexuality was explicitly discussed during the fYrefly Presentation, neither the University of Alberta nor my daughter's school notified us about the fYrefly Presentation. Further, notwithstanding the fact that we had directed our daughter's school not to expose her to explicit discussions regarding sexuality, and our daughter's teacher was present throughout the fYrefly Presentation, the school failed to notify our daughter that she was not required to attend the fYrefly Presentation. Our daughter was consequently present for the entire presentation.
- We have only recently learned that sections 16.1 and 50.1 of the *School Act* have been amended to prohibit schools from notifying parents if human sexuality will be explicitly discussed if such discussions take place as part of a "voluntary student organization" or an "activity". Thus, we now understand that schools are precluded from honouring parents' expressed directions to exclude their children from explicit discussions of human sexuality in those instances. According to material about fYrefly from the Faculty of Education on the University of Alberta website, attached as **Exhibit "D"** to this Affidavit, it appears specifically that teachers are instructed not to notify parents concerning presentations of

fYrefly: "Bill 10's ascension paved the way for fYrefly in Schools to participate in classroom contexts as a Human Rights program. As a Human Rights program, fYrefly in Schools is exempt from any obligation to parental notification."

- Immediately upon coming home after the fYrefly Presentation on Friday,
 February 2, 2018, our daughter told us what she heard from the fYrefly
 presenters. She was told that gender is "on a spectrum" and that there are more
 than two genders. She was further told that gender was based on feelings, not
 the biological sex people are "assigned" at birth, that people can be a different
 gender than that of their sex, and even that people can change their gender.
 Further still, she was told that sometimes girls are born into boys' bodies, but
 have a girls' brain, and that sometimes boys are born into girls' bodies, but have
 a boys' brain. Lastly, she was told that girls who feel like they are boys or have
 a boys' brain can "transition" to become boys.
- 13. What our daughter told us is entirely consistent with how the Institute for Sexual Minority Studies & Services describes its fYrefly presentations on the University of Alberta website. See **Exhibit "D"**. All this was told to my vulnerable, emotionally-delayed daughter, who was barely 13 years old at the time, without our knowledge or consent.
- Our daughter explained to us that the fYrely presenters had told her to not tell her parents what she had heard that day.
- Our daughter further explained to us that she felt anxious and confused during the fYrefly Presentation and wanted to leave, but felt that she was not allowed to.
- 16. After attending the fYrefly Presentation, our daughter told us on February 2, 2018, that she thought she might be a boy born into a girls' body and that she might have a boys' brain. Our daughter had never before expressed any indication or concern that she may be a boy. Given our daughter's impulsiveness and obsessive-compulsive behaviours, we immediately became very concerned for her well-being.

- 17. I immediately called the school principal and arranged for a meeting the next Monday. In that meeting with the school principal and my daughter's teacher who was present at the fYrefly presentation, I asked why our direction to exclude our daughter from discussions of human sexuality given in the Health Curriculum Content form were not followed. We had received written notice about recreation, photographs and sharing of our daughter's school number (see consent forms attached as **Exhibit "E"** to this affidavit), but we received no notice about the fYrefly Presentation focusing on human sexuality and gender. The principal and the teacher apologized for not notifying us of the fYrefly Presentation. Further, our daughter's teacher acknowledges that the children were told at the fYrefly Presentation not to go home and tell their parents. He further expressed regret that he did not provide students with an opportunity to leave the fYrefly Presentation if they were uncomfortable with it.
- 18. Unfortunately, after the fYrefly Presentation, our daughter quickly became obsessed with the idea that she may be a boy. Although she understood that she was physically a girl, she became convinced that she was really a boy trapped in a girls' body. This compulsive fixation that she is a boy has had a devastating effect on our daughter. She has experienced extreme anxiety, confusion and emotional and psychological turmoil.
- 19. Our daughter's obsession with her gender and gender identity has aggravated her social struggles. She refuses to attempt to make friends with girls and exclusively socializes with boys. She often behaves in ways that she thinks boys should behave.
- 20. Prior to the fYrely Presentation, our daughter cared appropriately for her appearance and personal hygiene and enjoyed presenting as feminine and wearing makeup. Following her exposure to the fYrely Presentation, her personal hygiene seriously declined and she avoids appearing in a feminine fashion.

- We immediately sought help for our daughter, and she was referred to a psychiatrist (see letter attached as **Exhibit "F"** to this affidavit), and has underwent extensive psychological counseling.
- Even after repeated treatment by a psychologist, our daughter has persisted in her compulsive obsession with the idea that she may be a male.
- Now, over a year after the fYrely Presentation, our daughter still believes she is a boy trapped in a girls' body.
- 24. The trust between ourselves and the educational system has been broken. We entrusted our vulnerable, impressionable daughter to her school and by extension the University of Alberta U School program. We had provided our express direction that our daughter not be exposed to concepts and ideas about sexuality that we knew she was not ready for. But with the fYrefly Presentation, our instructions were disregard and our vulnerable daughter has suffered and continues to suffer as result.
- 25. I swear this Affidavit bona fide and for no improper purpose.



U School is a program run by the <u>University of Alberta Senate</u> that aims to introduce and connect students in grades 4 through 9 from socially vulnerable, Aboriginal (First Nations, Métis and Inuit) and rural communities to the University of Alberta. Classes, with their classroom teachers, attend a week-long immersion experience on campus led by our <u>U School staff team</u>. Their week's schedule is built around the <u>teacher's application</u>, <u>Alberta curriculum</u> and the many opportunities available at the U of A.

U School runs from late September to early December and from late January to early April, based on the University's academic schedule. We employ a large number of <u>volunteers from the University community</u> to help build connections to post-secondary education for our participants.


In order to participate, schools must be:



fyrefly in Schools is an iSMSS educational initiative developed to help reduce discrimination against sexual and gender minority youth, increase awareness of the impacts of homo/bi/transphobia, and equip students with the tools they need to become effective allies for diversity, equity, and human rights within their schools and communities.

Session Goals

- Explore and engage with LGBTQ+ terminology
- Identify and analyze the effects of homophobic language

- · Debunk myths and stereotypes about LGBTQ people
- Identify ways to act as an 'ally' [in support of LGBTQ people and their rights]

FYrefly in schools - know your rights!

Bill 10 is "an act to amend the Alberta Bill of Rights to Protect our Children." Specifically, section 11.1.2 is amended to read "(3) This section (parental notification) does not apply to incidental or indirect references to religion, religious themes, human sexuality or sexual orientation in a course of study, educational program, instruction or exercises or in the use of instructional materials."

Bill 10's ascension paved the way for fYrefly in Schools to participate in classroom contexts as a Human Rights program. As a Human Rights program, fYrefly in Schools is exempt from any obligation to parental notification. Here is how we navigate the complexities of this conversation and how we train our Educators:

Educators and volunteer panelists know that they are not to delve into sexual health questions during sessions. It is possible that they may discuss attraction, or who they may enter into relationships, or partnerships with. (this is protected under the human rights act and removed from 11.1). There could also be discussion around asexuality, in that those who identify this way may not experience sexual/physical attraction.

Each session ends with a question period, where there is open discussion based on what the audience wishes to know more about. We have a question box students can submit to, so they can ask anonymously. It is important to note that we may not get to every question, and that sometimes questions will be omitted entirely if it is too personal, disrespectful to our volunteers or panelists, or goes beyond what is permitted as a point of discussion.

If questions come up that are omitted we will:

- Model a person's right to pass from answering invasive questions about their bodies
- · Direct students to the community resources, such as those available on the fYrefly website
- Encourage them to seek out good, scientifically accurate information from trusted adults/teachers.

• What are some other goals of the fYrefly in Schools program?

A key component of all fYrefly in Schools presentations is providing students with the opportunity to hear firsthand from a panel of peers who are sexual or gender minorities, self- identified allies who support sexual and gender minorities, and/or youth that have a family member who identifies as non-heterosexual. Along with providing a safe place for students to ask age-appropriate questions, the program's activities enable students to learn from their peers about (1) the coming out experience and processes of self and familial acceptance; (2) consequences of homophobic and/or transphobic bullying and guidelines to promote safety and wellbeing; and (3) positive aspects about "being who they are" in the world and the importance of recognizing diversity and difference as fundamental aspects of our society.

· What is fYrefly in Schools?

fYrefly in Schools is an educational initiative developed to help reduce discrimination against sexual and gender minority youth, increase awareness of the impacts of homophobia and transphobia, and create safe and inclusive school environments for all students. The program is free and reflects the focus on safety stated in Section 45 of the provincial School Act. This requires all students in Alberta's schools to be provided with a safe and caring environment where they do not experience discrimination based on personal characteristics including sexual orientation and gender identity. fYrefly in Schools is delivered to schools on a request basis, as resources of the Institute for Sexual Minority Studies and Services permit. Designed for junior and senior high school students, fYrefly in Schools workshops are student- centred and activity-based to focus on personal and social development and comprehensive health. Workshops follow the peer-to-peer mentorship model of our award-winning summer leadership retreat, Camp fYrefly.

Who facilitates fYrefly in Schools workshops and how are they structured?

Trained and experienced educators facilitate fYrefly in Schools workshops, which range from 40 – 80 minutes in length. Each session consists of a number of targeted activities that address the following themes: Awareness, De-stigmatization, Humanization, and Empowerment. Through a series of student-centred activities, these interactive workshops are designed to increase students' understanding of LGBTQ (lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer) related terminology, engage with common assumptions and stereotypes, and address some of the unique safety, health, and educational challenges that sexual and gender minorities face in schools. Specifically, these sessions provide participants with a safe learning environment to reflect upon the impacts of homophobic and transphobic language and bullying. Students are encouraged to be proactive and construct positive and productive ways to reduce discrimination and harassment of sexual and gender minority youth and those perceived to be LGBTQ by their peers.
